

IF THE HEART CAN CHANGE, THE WORLD CAN CHANGE TOO

Philip Tarris: Rector

It is seven years since I was licensed by Bishop Stephen Cottrell (now Archbishop of York!) to our village parishes and 15 months later to Thaxted too. I shall be retirina in July and making way for someone



younger - so how do I reflect on my time here and where we are as a church in this changing world?

To try and answer that question let's return to the said Archbishop who has just published another book, the inspiration for which came from an encounter he had at Paddington Station. He was buying a coffee before catching a train to Wales and the barista, noticing his clerical collar, looked him up and down and asked him 'What made you become a priest?' He didn't have long to answer as he had to get the train, but the gist of his response to her was two-fold.

Firstly, that he believed in God and had reached a point where life, the universe and everything in it made no sense without God, and moreover in Jesus there was a person through whom God

had a human face and a human heart. Secondly, he told her, he wanted to change the world – to help change the human heart because if the heart can change then the world can change too.

Bishop Stephen didn't have time to develop the conversation before catching the train – so he wrote the book instead – and I thoroughly recommend you read it (ref below). And in a way, my personal reflection on my time here resonates with the Bishop's conversation with the barista.

It is probably why many of us get ordained. Because we can't see how the world makes sense without God, and we have ambitions to share how Jesus can change the human heart. And I am privileged to have worked with lots of wonderful people in and around our five churches over the last seven years who share that ambition, although they will articulate it in different ways. These are people who are committed to their faith and draw on that resource to help contribute to the community.

Which, of course, is what it is all about. We church people need to make sure that what we talk about on Sundays affects what we do on Mondays! I remember speaking to a couple wanted their child baptised in Thaxted, who firmly reminded me that that many people don't want to come to church to be "talked at". The best thing the church and its people can do is to out and visible in the community doing things for others, demonstrating love in action in the community. Trying to change the world in fact.

However, I do also worry for our churches who struggle with finance and five grade 1 listed buildings! Small, and reducing, numbers of faithful congregations, are tasked with finding time, and very large sums of money, to maintain the 'infrastructure' of the church as we have inherited it today. A task for which they receive financial support from the church at the centre (despite the belief of many that the church is flush with money). A task which is quite frankly getting too much for the smaller churches. Faithful love and service is being consumed by the practicalities, leaving little time to change hearts and minds.

So, my conclusion is that change is on the way. Some of it will be forced by these practicalities and some people may not like the prospect of losing their village church which becomes a real possibility with every passing vear. But out of change something new and fresh will emerge. They don't call ours a resurrection faith for nothing. I am with the Archbishop. I too believe that Jesus not only showed what God is like, but shows us what humanity can be like. Which is why, in the preaching and teaching that I have been able to do I have tried to concentrate on that very thing. Trying to make what we hear on Sundays affect how we live on Mondays. Trying to tell the story of what God has done in Jesus Christ to change the course of human history and to win our hearts.

If that strikes a chord with you then please read the Archbishop's book – it may help to change the world.

Dear England. Finding hope, taking heart and changing the world. By Stephen Cottrell.

"WILDE ESSEX"

 a unique perspective on our landscape from a Thaxted artist

landscape The Essex is traditionally underrated by artists in favour of more classically romantic areas. It is being lost through constant building of housing, roads and related sprawling infrastructure at an alarming rate. If people do paint Essex, they do the obviously cute bits and the character, listed buildings. Swathes of Essex have a romantic beauty all their own a quiet, magical bleakness, a gentle and peaceful ancient heart, but you have to stop and be aware with all your senses to experience it – rather than just being simply handed an immediate wham-bam drama. I have lived here for most of my life and walked and ridden thousands of miles here. I am intimately involved with our storm-bruised skies, blazina summer sunsets, the hazelly-brick clay and the history of the land where mammoth's teeth were dug up, forgotten iron-age sites, tumuli nestled in the landscape, decayed Roman roads, green lanes, hollow-ways and droves, and the sites of lost and destroyed farm-workers'

cottages, medieval barns and manors pulled down after the last war.

In this series of work, I am deliberately working on a small scale in order to ask people to to really look, draw your attention in to quiet, dream-like vistas that first appear relatively empty but if you take the time to really see, are filled with detail and colour. I am seeking to evoke, rather than describe, and asking you to attend more closely to the easily-overlooked and really experience it - in effect taking a still-life approach to the essence of the world around us. I hope that through being asked to notice deep beauty in these simple lines, people may learn to look more slowly and carefully at the world around them, and perhaps develop deeper а respect and love for the land instead of seeing it simply as a commodity.

I spend a great deal of time outside and every day I see a thousand paintings in the changing shape and light of one cloud, casting shadows on the meadow below; the light in a puddle with birds' footprints in the mud beneath, in a field that had once а name: the kaleidoscopic colours of a single tree. One star in the early night sky, the wrinkled bark of our ancient boundary oaks, the gentle mists and fog with its landenfolding shifts and drifts. I am constantly aware of how connected to the land, and how insignificant I am. If I spend the rest of my life painting, I will never have time to come close to trying to evoke the beauty around me.



I make many of my own paints and use as many natural

materials as possible, particularly pigments dug from the earth, to paint the earth. I use ochres dug from the 7,000 year old ochre mines at Clearwell Caves, Epping vellow ochre, Mudlark Verdigris (made from found copper on the banks of the Thames), Suffolk chalks, a ground blue stone Vivianite called which was discovered in a Cornish mine; powdered Iron ore, natural woad blue from Somerset, genuine Indigo, oak gall and walnut inks, ground slate and greys powdered English willow charcoal. name to а few. Handling materials that have been used by generations of painters for thousands of years is an alchemical process. Where I do use synthetic pigments, I favour medieval colours like Smalt (ground blue glass), Sepia and Caput Mortuum (an iron oxide), and use oil paint made from pigment reclaimed from cleaning water. I work in a mixture of hand-made oil paints, dry pigment, charcoal, inks. graphite and pencils made at the Derwent factory in the North of England. When I can get them, I love to work on found surfaces.

STEPHEN FLOOD

Stephen was active member of the Thaxted Catholic Church and was also widely known as a much respected vet. He died at home after collapsing on Sunday January 24 at the age of 57. He had worked for Mercer and Hughes since previously 1991. working in Harlow,

and before that for two years in Ireland following his graduation from University College Dublin in 1985. Stephen's prudent work ethic saw him become one of the partners at Mercer and Hughes.

Stephen had a loyal following among his clients, his 'fan club' as they were called, appreciated his straight-talking manner and obvious care for the animals he looked after. Apparently all the pets in his care were always called Pickle, no matter what breed, shape or size! Stephen is remembered for always showing kindness and gratitude after a long working day, as he made a point of thanking each and every person when leaving theatre after an operation or when leaving the surgery at the end of



a clinic. It is said his bear hugs were phenomenal and his singing would resonate and brighten even the most stressful of days. He was а true Irishman of generous gregarious and character: he was a loyal rugby fan. dedicated parishioner and keen

collector of Labradors.

Steve was a highly spirited, fun loving Irishman who at one time played rugby for the Saffron Walden RFC. He went on to help with the coaching of their Colts team as well as Mini rugby.

His children were all born in Thaxted and they lived first in Bolford Street, then Bardfield Road. For many evenings Stephen was to be found entertaining in The Swan.

Stephen was a dedicated family man, a family that were his pride and joy. He will be sadly missed by so many.

As a final gesture Town Street was filled with mourners as his horse drawn hearse was driven to the Parish Church

CELEBRATING 200 YEARS OF THAXTED'S LINCOLN ORGAN

2020 was for all of us, not least the Lincoln Organ Committee, an extraordinary year. Owing to the pandemic arrangements for a series of organ recitals given by accomplished organists was abandoned just before the first recital was due to be given.

However, the year saw a significant change of membership from several of the original committee of local volunteers established in 2006, led by Sybil King BEM who was the driving force. This committee, with successive members, succeeded marvellously in its task to raise a considerable amount for the restoration in 2014. Sadly, Sybil has moved away from Thaxted, as have Chris and Sheilah Rengert; Michael Bailie and Maureen Walker now feel it is time for them to hand over their responsibilities. So Kate Barker, Ann Pickhaver and Christopher Bayston have been joined by Stephen Odom, Richard Till, Noelle Till, Oliver Wilson forming the new committee with Chris Brown as Chairman.

The organ, built for St John's Chapel, Bedford Row in Bloomsbury in 1821 by Henry Lincoln, was moved to Thaxted Parish Church in 1858. With the organ wonderfully restored the committee's work has changed its focus. We will continue to ensure its condition be properly monitored with necessary maintenance undertaken. In addition, we will be arranging recitals and seeking to develop its use, particularly for educational purposes. We seek to make the organ's special contribution to the development of instrumental music more widely appreciated. We hope thereby to attract specialists to Thaxted and make our contribution to this town's rich artistic heritage. The organ is already 'on the map' and is a valuable resource, the significance of this instrument as a unique little-altered Georgian organ was recognised by the award of a certificate Grade 1 as a rare instrument of its period by the British Institute of Organ Studies.

During this year's Thaxted Festival the recital on Saturday 26 June at noon celebrates 200 years since the Lincoln Organ's inauguration. Robin Walker's programme will include works by many composers who were alive at the time of its installation.

MEN'S SHED – CHURCH VOLUNTEERS

THAXTED RANGERS - YOUTH DIVISION

Three years ago, a number of different factors had seen the youth division at Thaxted Rangers dwindle significantly. So when a parent approached the now Chairman, Martin Tritton, about starting a new team for her child to play in, Martin had no way of knowing quite how dramatically the tide was about to turn. "I was initially contacted by just one parent looking for a local team for her son. It had always been the plan to start re-developing the club but this was the catalyst. With the enthusiasm of one parent, suddenly there were 8 budding new players, which rapidly grew to 12, and we began to realise that there was really high demand for the provision of football in the community."

Following the launch of that initial youth team, a group of volunteers formed a new committee. Their aim was to work collaboratively to ensure grassroots football was revived in the area. In the 3 years since Martin was first approached, Thaxted Rangers FC has gone from strength to strength. Talking of the club's growth he reveals how their motto of 'The Home of Fair Play' has shaped the way they've approached the last few years. "The growth of the club has certainly been dramatic" he says "In the last 3 years we have gone from just 3 teams, to approximately 130 registered players ranging in age from 6 to 56. We feel much of that success is because of the positive, nurturing environment we have worked to create, which has afforded more people the opportunity to enjoy the beautiful game."

Thaxted's Youth division is now thriving and dynamic, with a focus on fair play for all, and Martin's plan is to keep it that way, even in the current climate. "The one thing that nobody in grassroots had anticipated was a pandemic. Primarily run by volunteers and with little guidance and training in dealing with its impact, somehow we have managed to navigate through and get our players back on the pitch as safely as possible"

Now, as the club continues to grow and with demand increasing, they are looking to find more land in the town to support their growth. "The Rec has been our home for many years and will remain so, but in truth we need more pitches. In recent years we have been fortunate enough to hire pitches within our kind neighbouring

villages, but where possible we would like to keep our teams within the community of Thaxted."

The club says that Thaxted Parish Council have been very supportive with their plight, however with no locally owned areas of land suitable, they are now appealing for any local land owner(s) who may be willing to help, to contact them. "We understand this is a HUGE request but we are extremely keen to speak to anyone who has an area of land that could be converted to house 3-4 grass pitches, or even just 1 which could be the game changer!"

In the meantime, the club will continue working hard to provide the first class, fun, FA accredited football coaching, for which they've become renowned. After the past year especially, they say there is nothing better than the sound of children playing on their pitches... and funnily enough, the children agree!

HOPE IN ACTION: THE CHANTRY COMMUNITY HUB

I hope that you are beginning to hear much more about the Chantry – that wonderful, thatched building opposite the Almshouses. Because the plans for the Chantry's future are now really beginning to come to fruition.

The coronavirus pandemic has forced us all to spend time apart and some people have been very much alone. And as we start to see a way out of the pandemic the need to meet and be with people, and to have a popular meeting place, has greatly increased. Social isolation needs to become social interaction.

The Chantry can play a key role. Situated in the centre of town, next to the church and on the way to the windmill, a refurbished Chantry could form a community hub, for use by the wider population, visitors, local businesses and the churches. It could be used for people to meet informally or in more organised meetings. There are suggestions to provide refreshments for people from the town and our many visitors on summer afternoons using the garden too. The facilities could be of considerable value when there are large gatherings in the church, for concerts, arts events community functions and church services.



Significantly it will offer toilets with proper access (there are none in the church), a kitchen and a good-sized meeting space.

The project so far has involved a few members of the church and other members of the wider community. We are now engaging even more widely via various means, including social media, for ideas as to how people would like to use the hub, seeking to give people a sense of ownership. The voluntary sector will also be involved as hopefully they will also see the Chantry as a place where they can interact with local people during and after the pandemic.

Plans have now been prepared, permissions granted and tenders received. So, we are nearly ready to go! But, of course, this is costing money. We have some of it from existing funds and grants but we need at least another £50,000. We are continuing to apply for grants, but we are really hoping that the town and surrounding villages will take this project to heart and want to do everything they can to protect and restore this iconic building, and give it a real purpose for the Thaxted area.

So please support our Chantry campaign. It is amazing what we can do with crowd funding if we all give a little. If 2,000 of us gave £20 we would be nearly there! So share this with your friends!


Conservation Garden for hosting us. We plan to return to indoor meetings before too long, probably at Thaxted Youth Club.

Thaxted Festival 2021

Thaxted Festival is back for two long weekends of the best in music, from 24-27 June and 1-4 July. Tickets are now on general sale, although they have been selling extremely fast since priority booking opened in early April.

We have been so grateful to everyone for their support during 2020, which is the first time for 40 years that Thaxted has been without a summer music Festival. This support has enabled us to keep going, adapt our systems, and also give ourselves a new look which is well-suited to age of digital publicity and bookings. Our volunteer team stands ready to welcome you once again this year.

Planning for this season has presented a lot of challenges, but our artists can't wait to perform with us. For some it will be their first live performances since early March last year. All seats in the main nave and side aisle areas are sold as pairs and single, with spaces between them and with alternate rows removed. This ensures we comply with distancing regulations which may still be in place. (It also means that our seating capacity is limited, which is why availability is getting very restricted.) However, we are also offering additional seating along the sides of the stage. Initially these seats will also be distanced, but if regulations allow nearer the time, we can make all of these side-stage seats for sale.

As always, our season contains something for all tastes, from leading artists in their fields. Orchestral and chamber music is brought to us by the Heath Quartet, young cellist Laura van der Heijden with pianist Jams Coleman, Howard Shelley and London Mozart Players, and the Covent Garden Sinfonia with Christopher Weston, piano. A taste of the 1920s is offered by our Patron, Zeb Soanes, and Selina Cadell performing William Walton's *Façade*, together with *Carnival of the*

Animals, with Covent Garden Soloists. This latter work will form the centrepiece of a music project with Thaxted Primary School, for which we are grateful for the support of Yardley's Charity and Thaxted Fayre Trust.

Vocal music is always a treat in Thaxted Church, and this year we welcome the stunning young vocal ensemble VOCES8, with a wideranging programme from Bach and Byrd to Gershwin and van Morrison! Our long-term friends Opus Anglicanum return with a programme of Gregorian Chants and other sacred music, together with piano virtuoso Jason Rebello, who improvises along with their voices.

Jazz, our other staple, is represented by the Darius Brubeck Quartet. Darius is one of Dave Brubeck's talented sons, who performs his own works, standards, and of course, favourites by his father.

Thaxted's Lincoln Organ features in a recital by Robin Walker, who returns with a programme of works suited to the era of this historic instrument in the year of its 200th anniversary, while also celebrating some other musical anniversaries.

Our full programme is on our website, where you can also see videos of many of our artists in performance. All bookings should be made online through the booking links on this site. You will then receive e-tickets which can be printed out or displayed on your device. Entry will be via either the north or south door of the church. Our office remains closed, but if you are passing you can pick up a leaflet from the dispenser outside.


Who would have thought a few years ago that we can take a phone with us when we go for a walk and then be able to use it to identify wildflowers and trees? As summer arrives, we will again enjoy the walks around our town. I am not going to advertise "Thaxted Walks" booklet available from the Information Centre/Library again, but I will remind you of the P3 volunteers who have continued to keep our paths clear and easy to walk. Look out for the yellow topped way marker posts. Our varied rights of way routes provide a opportunity wonderful to appreciate the variety of wildflowers arowina in field margins and hedgerows.

After the chilly start to the year, the warmer days are flowers encouraging the to provide essential nectar and pollen to support visitina pollinators. With the increasing alarming concern about the reduction in insect numbers. many of those caring for green spaces have adopted the 'NO MOW IN MAY' approach to grass maintenance, where the uncut grassy places can support a surprisingly large number of different native species. Their flowers add variety to these areas and the bees benefit as well!

Wayside plants such as Stinging Nettles, Goosegrass (the long, hairy plant that sticks to your socks) and Cow Parsley thrive alongside lanes and tracks. Cow parsley, with its splay of tiny white flowers, can grow as high as a person. A touch of pink is often added by the flowers of Red Campion, also known as Bachelor's Buttons as it might have been worn as a buttonhole by unmarried men.

Common bright yellow flowers include Dandelions and the shiny golden petals of a great variety of Buttercups. The tall Ox-eye Daisy is often present where wildflower mixtures have been sown.

The types of wildflower I have listed can be seen and enjoyed almost everywhere in the paths around Thaxted. There are many more varieties to be seen and occasionally something quite rare. So maybe you too will become a smart phone user with the identification apps. Meanwhile remember we do not have to be experts to appreciate and enjoy nature's abundance.

YARDLEYS CHARITY

Once again Yardleys Charity has been generous enough to donate money to keep the ABC and U, our parish magazine, in production after the two lockdowns when we have not been able to produce one. There are those of you, new to the area, who will not know about Yardleys and the significance it has played in the development of Thaxted. Thomas Yerdele, a local landowner died, leaving his estate to his sons. In his will dated first February in the 21st year of the reign of Henry V1 1443 he left some of his land firstly to his family and the rest to be sold "for the good of the church, the relief of the poorest inhabitants and the upkeep of the roads". It seems the that the property was first administered by trustees in 1470 but when the sons of Thomas Yardley died childless in 1490, the principal inhabitants decided to purchase the property to pay for taxes, known as tenths and fifteenths, for the sake of the town. It is not known exactly which land Thomas Yardley left as over the years there seems to have been land bought and exchanged but now it has the same boundaries as a survey map, made in 1746 by the trustees, 185 acres, 1 rod and 24 perches.

Over the years the income from the farm has provided many benefits for Thaxted's inhabitants. The water and sewage systems were updated, so there was no more raw sewage running down the street. A fire engine was provided, which can still be seen in the windmill. From the early 1600's, Yardleys was involved in the maintenance of a school and a schoolmaster. The charity has also contributed to the preservation and upkeep of the Guildhall and provided money toward the reparation of the houses in Town Street. Today, the charity is able to donate money to worthy causes in the town, which is why we are able to provide the inhabitants with the parish magazine free of charge. Thank you, Thomas Yerdley!

Today Yardleys charity is the working title of Town Estate Charity number 227363 It operates as two bodies, Town Estate non-Ecclesiastical Charity (two thirds of the income) and Town Estate Ecclesiastical Charity (one third of the income). The Charity owns the freehold of Yardleys Farm, Thaxted and its income is derived from the rent of the farm, farm buildings and from investments.

LORD MAYNARD'S CHARITY

In his will, dated 30th May 1698, the Rt. Hon. William, Lord Maynard allocated £4000 for his executors to use for several purposes including helping the people of Thaxted, in particular families with young children and apprentices, which today includes students.

The charity is in the care of three Trustees and is administered by the them together with the Vicar of Thaxted, the Churchwardens, and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of Thaxted Parish Council.

Applications are invited from eligible <u>residents of Thaxted</u> to benefit from the charity that fall into one of the following categories:

- 1. Families with three or more children under the age of 16 on the qualifying date 31st August 2021. Please give the names and dates of birth of the qualifying children.
- 2. Couples one or both being resident in Thaxted who were married in Thaxted Parish Church within the previous twelve months of the qualifying date 31st August 2021. Please give the date of the marriage.
- 3. Students undertaking further education. This excludes sixth form colleges. Please give the name of the course and of the college or university. Please note only one application can be made.
- 4. Apprentices. Please give the name of the company to whom the applicant is apprenticed. Please note that only one application can be made.

Distribution of grants depends on the funds available and the number of applications received. Applications should be sent to Daniel Fox, Moulton, Vicarage Lane, Thaxted CM6 2QP or email to thaxtedfox@gmail.com to arrive by 31st July 2021. They will be reviewed at a meeting of the Trustees and Administrators to be held in September 2021.

FOSTER CARE FORTNIGHT

"There is no greater reward than seeing your foster children develop into happy young people who are enjoying their childhood!" Says a fostering couple from West Essex.

Over the past year, there has been much concern across the UK about the impact of Covid on children's physical and mental wellbeing. They have had disrupted routines, time away from school and missed opportunities to physically interact with friends due to the pandemic. Although only a temporary pause in childhood experiences, there is much concern over the long-lasting impact this period of increased anxiety may have on our young people. It has also highlighted the tragic fact that many children go hungry, unless fed at school.

In Foster Care Fortnight, which ran from 10 - 23 May, Essex County Council were seeking to highlight how missing out on aspects of childhood can often be a sustained normality for many children arriving into care. They also wanted to highlight the life changing difference foster carers are making in giving children a second chance at the childhood they have been deprived of and helping them to recover from the trauma experienced.

Essex County Council's Consultant Clinical Psychologist, Barbara Canepa said: "Childhood should be a time of nurturing and feeling safe to play, learn, socialise and explore – a pivotal point which lays the foundation for the adult they become. Playing and feeling secure enough to behave like a child is essential to the cognitive, physical, social, and emotional well-being of young people.

Sadly, it's quite common for many foster children to have missed out on large parts of their childhood through trauma and neglect, many have also played a parenting role to their younger siblings and parents".

Barbara added: "Foster carers can help a child heal from their trauma by giving them a second chance at childhood. Our role is to give them the knowledge, support and tools to do so".

Two foster carers, who have been fostering for six years. describe their experiences of fostering the brothers aged 12 and 9 in their care. Their eldest foster child lost out on a large part of his childhood as he took on the role of both mother and father at a young age. He would

routinely look after his younger brother; going to the shops to buy food, cooking them dinner, and making sure he got ready for school.

"Fostering isn't about 'saving' a young person – it's about helping a young person recover from their past traumas and be the best they can be through stability, consistency, and love. "We will hopefully help them to develop the self-confidence, ability, and life skills they will need to become the successful adults they deserve to be".

Due to the impact of Coronavirus the fostering service has seen a 30% reduction in approved foster carers this year. Essex County Council is therefore urging more people like these two to support vulnerable children by becoming a foster carer. They recommend that anyone thinking about fostering children or young people should just pick up the phone and enquire.

"Fostering really has been the best decision we ever made as a couple and it's totally changed our lives together for the better. The difference you can make to a young person, just by treating them as part of your family, is huge. "And that's very much how we see our foster children – a part of our family. There is no greater reward than seeing them develop into happy young people who are enjoying their childhood!"


Clarance House Conservation Garden is re-opening to the public from 22nd May; it will be open every Saturday and Sunday from 10 am to 5 pm until the Autumn.

ACTION FOR FAMILY CARERS

Popular Dementia Activity Group Reopens in Dunmow

People living with dementia can once again benefit from a hugely popular weekly Activity Group in Dunmow run by Essex-based charity Action for Family Carers which has reopened following 4 months of closure due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

More than a dozen people attend the Dunmow group and a further 50 in West Essex attend similar groups mixing with others and participating in a variety of mentally physically and stimulating ranging activities from seated exercise, indoor bowling, reminiscence discussions and games often including music.

The Groups are led by a small team of professional and caring staff and a large number of dedicated local volunteers. Morning sessions, called Keeping Active, focus on physical activity and afternoon sessions, called Active Minds, focus on activities to stimulate the mind.

Physical activity is an important part of a healthy lifestyle and can help overall wellbeing. It can give opportunities to spend time with others, reducing isolation and loneliness and support people to continue being independent.

Cognitive stimulation involves activities and exercises that stimulate thinking, concentration, communication and memory in the person with dementia. It involves talking about day-to-day interests, reminiscence and information relating to the current time and place.

Group Activity Support Manager, Clare Savva, said "There's never been a more important time for groups such as ours which help stimulate minds and bodies and reduce feelings of loneliness and isolation. The group also provides a much-needed break for carers who are often close family members."

The Activity Group takes place in Great Canfield Village Hall near Dunmow on Mondays 10-12.30pm and 1-3.30pm and new members are welcome.

JOHN WEBB'S WINDMILL - AN UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

As we all know, 2020 was a very difficult and challenging year on many levels. Consequently, progress on the repair and restoration of the Windmill was also slowed down. However, we are pleased to report that the investigation works have since picked up momentum.

The Trust was very fortunate to secure a grant from Historic England for Project Development works last year. These encompass in depth investigations into the issues that the building is facing and then the planning of repairs with the associated costs.

A full digital survey of the Windmill was undertaken using the latest technology and this has allowed the conservation specialists to see the building in detail as never before. In addition, a damp monitoring system has been installed and will run for the next year. The information gained from the research at Thaxted Windmill will also be shared throughout the Mill community to help other buildings in a similar situation.

A full investigation day, coordinated by Ed Morton of The Morton Partnership, took place at the end of February. This involved a team of specialists examining both the interior and exterior of the Windmill in great detail. Samples of both brickwork and timber have been taken for analysis and hopefully, the findings will throw more light



onto how the ageing process is affecting the building. We are awaiting final reports as this piece goes to press.

A team of Ecologists have also conducted a survey and have been present throughout any investigation work. This is to ensure that there is no impact on the Windmill's resident Bat families and that their roosts are left undisturbed.

The Trustees would like to express their thanks to everyone who has been involved with this stage of the work. And, also to people both locally and further afield who continue to support the Trust. The Trustees would also like to acknowledge Thaxted Parish Council for their continued backing through what is a very interesting development in the history of the Windmill.

At some point in the future the Trust will be launching a fund raising campaign to help meet the costs of restoring the Windmill. Please keep an eye out for any announcements and for up to date information please follow the Windmill Facebook page: www.facebook.com/johnwebbswindmillthaxted/


